4. Committee Updates

a. Rio Arriba

- i. Krista Kelley: Judge Lidyard is transitioning to Santa Fe and will take Judge Marlow-Sommers place as CJCC Council Chair. He will also be updating for Rio Arriba committee today.
- ii. Judge Lidyard:
  1. Impressed with collaborative work that is being done and appreciative of everyone's work.
  2. Detox subcommittee
    - a. Establish Detox center in Rio Arriba County
    - b. Because of Darren's Place hard work, they are close to opening the Detox facility.
    - c. Just awaiting hiring.
  3. Crisis Response
    - a. Don't have resources to establish 24/7 crisis response team, looking at an alternative model that would establish follow-

up for overdoses. Stabilize overdose person and bring them to safe status. Crisis intervention will reach out to individual next day to provide them with resources like Peer Support to assist them in navigating and avoid a further overdose episode.

#### 4. Peer Support

- a. Rio Arriba is only County that has Peer Support services at each intercept of the Sequential Intercept model. Prior to charging Re-route program. After charging pre-trial services, Post adjudication/conviction peer probation.
- b. Looking to find other ways to incorporate peers.
- c. Through sub-committee able to assist NM Re-Entry, a new organization in RA County to enter the detention center to provide group therapy sessions and assist in re-entry plans for those who are 30 days from re-entry. The program assists people as soon as they are discharged. They can transport the individual to wherever they need to be transported once discharged. They can connect with appointment the next day at the physical location. They also have two sober living sites one for women (located in Santa Fe) and one for men (just south of RA County line near Sombrios).

#### b. Santa Fe

- i. Krista Kelley: Update – after SIM mapping session, the priorities that came out were: Re-entry, Housing and Peer Support. This will be the three committees that will be formed from that. Will be having committee meetings starting in July.
- ii. Anne Ryan, Community Svcs. Director, Santa Fe County:
  1. Exciting time in behavioral health. Attended recent Exec. Committee meeting when 7 member council was inaugurated. The council includes the current sitting heads for: Healthcare Authority, BH services division, Medicaid Svcs. Division, Admin. Office of Courts, along with 3 appointed citizens including Senator Ortiz y Pino, Dr. Cloud, and BH expert from Silver City. Meeting included over 300 BH providers from throughout NM. Committee Voted to: Committee voted on network jurisdictions following judicial districts. In many ways resurrects the core service agency model. Phase I – includes SIM mapping for each county within judicial districts. Contracting with UNM Health Sciences Center to refresh SIM mapping. Will be doing same mapping for youth. Very clear with public comment that need is now. Next meeting is August 5 and another one in September. Strongly encourage everyone to attend. SF County Community Svcs. will go in front of

BCC to present priorities for next term, which is Sept. to Sept. SF County priorities are as follows: Short term priorities: 1) Regional Youth BH Center. Believe this will be very relevant to Exec. Committee priorities. 2) Re-Entry. Over 50% of those housed at SF County Adult Detention facility are from all over the region. Average daily population is 250-300. Within last 3-5 years 1/3 of individuals are unhoused. In so many ways, it is the largest psychiatric hospital, detox center, mental health, homeless shelter. There will continue to be significant investments from the County to look at continuity of care in a way that aligns with the current restructuring of the BH system. Developing a system of care that ties in with all of the regional objectives. 3) Housing. Strong pressure from BCC to develop trauma informed, permanent, supportive housing. Very pleased to learn that two Congressionally direct funding applications are moving in the right direction with seed money. Want this to be regionally driven.

c. Los Alamos

- i. Judge Allen: just finished SIM mapping previous week. LA County priorities are: Peer Support, Crisis Response, Detox.
- ii. Jessica Strong: exciting to hear about Regional Youth BH Center and interested in partnering. Excited to get started with committee meetings.
- iii. Krista Kelley: committees will be structured as a result of priorities identified the SIM mapping sessions. Plan is to gather all regions in a full strategic planning session so that we can identify regional collaboration priorities. Excited about collaborative opportunities.

d. Questions/Comments:

- i. Anne Ryan: SF County Community Svcs. Dept. and Jail presented to Leg. HHS Committee regarding use of allocated opioid settlement funds. DOH gets over \$3 million allocated for DOH buildings that are typically owned by counties for operated by DOH for MAT services. Senator Stefanics asked how we can align and leverage. Grace Phillips, Assoc. of Counties was also asking how to leverage BH funds with Opioid settlement funding. When we look at strategic planning, we should consider looking at how we can leverage wisely and potentially braid funding. Important to include CCBHC's because they have 9 mandatory services that if not being met, counties and municipalities do have a voice in the matter.

5. Senate Bill 3

- a. Rachel O'Connor: Spoke with Healthcare Authority regarding follow-up presentation from Nick Bacchus, Chair of BH Exec. Committee. Important because it allows CJCC to put forth collective priorities for district. BH Reform and Investment Act – piece of legislation that came from 2025 leg. Session in SB 3. Provides reform to BH system in NM. Many changes already occurring at

healthcare authority in terms of Re-entry waiver and development of CCBHC's and State plan for use of opioid settlement funds. Key players identified in legislation include state agencies: HC Authority, Medicaid, BH Services Division, AOC, Community Members, other state agencies. Does not include CYFD and representation of childrens issues. Calls on providers, tribes, pueblos, CJCC's, local government, institutes of higher learning to participate in development of plan. Needs to be prioritized within CJCC because work of CJCC's is relevant, groundbreaking and effective and lead to state funding. Deliverables in alignment: sequential mapping, regional plans, BH standards (BH division is rewriting standards to be adopted in regional plans. Posted on website.). Mixture of state agency and community-based responsibilities in this as well. Important that there is funding attached to new system. Blending of ideas coming out of HC authority with respect to waiver and how that is prioritized within judicial districts. Will be important to keep apprised of what is going on with the Committee. Priorities: Re-entry, Peer Support, development of CCBHC's, coordination of 911 and 988, providing feedback to state as far as what is working at local level.

6. NM Sentencing Commission Grant

- a. Jamie Goldberg: Sentencing Commission funding established through legislature was completely cut this past session. Approx. \$4 million in HB 2 when it left the House, however did not pass Senate. \$7-800K left over from previous funding periods to work with for this funding period. \$8 million in requests. Tried to give something to each district. Most requests were funded between 25-40%. Anticipating asking for funding again this coming leg. session. Please reach out to legislators to let them know how important funding is.
- b. Krista Kelley: Grant request for FJD Coordination of CJCC was not granted as a result of funding cut. In turn, requested funding from each of the counties to fund the coordination. Two of the counties have committed to finding funding. Still waiting on one of the counties to get back to FJD. Putting together IGA's to solidify funding to FJD.

8. Additional Announcements

- a. Kateri Eisenberg: Wanted to thank Krista Kelley for coordination of the CJCC over last year, having seen strategic planning over last year being implemented.
- b. Krista Kelley – excited about success in implementing strategic plan Rio Arriba and future success in Los Alamos and Santa Fe Counties.
